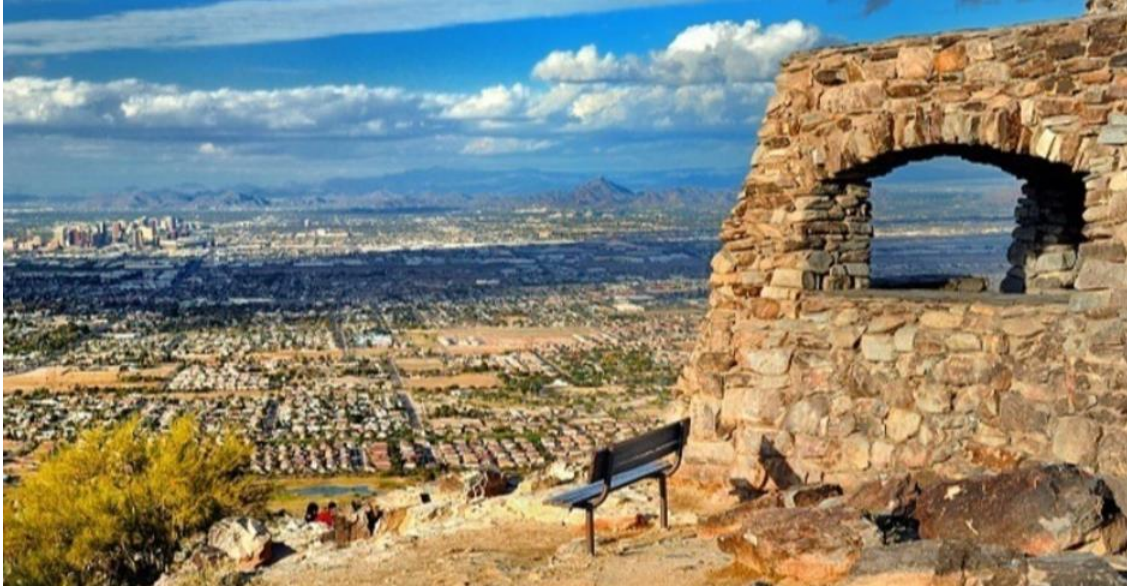

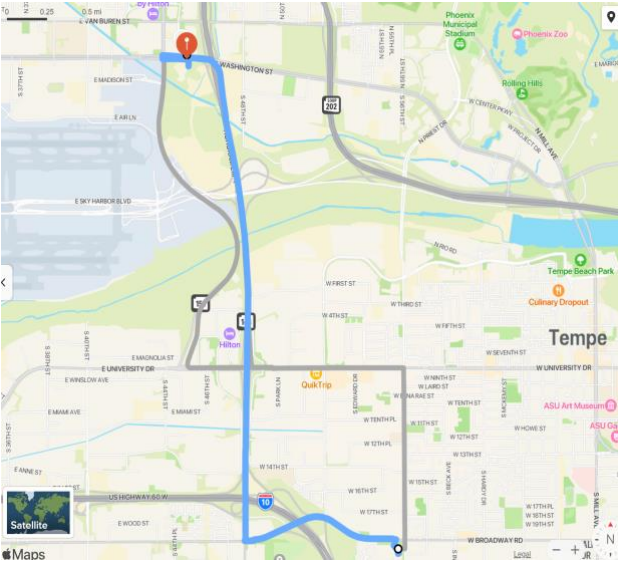
CONFERENCE REGISTRATION BOOTH

Hurray for Hoffmantowns! The Postwar Housing Phenomenon

When Sam Hoffman commissioned Ralph Haver AIA in 1949 to design modest brick homes just south of the Biltmore, neither had a clue they were laying down a blueprint for dozens of neighborhoods and thousands of homes nationwide. In the decade to follow, these "Hoffmantowns" would be planted as far afield as Albuquerque, Denver, and Chicago, filling a niche for quality affordable housing. Hoffman erected four houses a day, earning him the nickname "The Henry Ford of the Homebuilding Industry." Come hear this remarkable story of postwar housing and see how Hoffman's legacy shaped the urban landscape of Phoenix and the Southwest.

The Importance of Community Development Corporations During and Post Pandemic

Highlighting the Impact of RAIL CDC - Retail, Arts, Innovation & Livability Community Development Corporation. RAIL CDC is a place-based community development corporation (CDC) that offers small business technical assistance, corridor development, and neighborhood organizing in LMI census tracts around public transit. In 2020, this CDC provided 3.9 million dollars in grants and Technical Assistance directly to 264 small "mom & pops" located along the West Mesa Light Rail Corridor, Asian Business District, District Latino, and Tempe Apache Light Rail Corridor. Come learn about the types of technical assistance services that RAIL has and still continues to offer, the partnerships that they have forged, and the outcomes that are being tracked and measured.

Wildfire and Archaeology: Two-Part Workshop

The significant increase in wildfires across the western landscape has had a major impact on archaeological and cultural resources. This session is going to discuss the role of archaeology and archaeologists during a wildfire event, the effects of fire on archaeological resources, and how wildfire can work within the context of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. Land managers will receive recommendations and proactive steps to take to protect resources prior to a wildfire and ways to assess and address post fire effects.

An introduction to the awareness and importance of footwear and tire impressions for Site Stewards. Being alert to footwear and tire impressions in the area of the site you are checking is important for your safety. It may be critical in aiding law enforcement with a successful investigation and criminal prosecution or civil suit against the looters or vandals.

Interpretation of the impressions as they relate to activity at the site and how to properly document footwear and tire impressions will be demonstrated in the classroom and a nearby field exercise.

Postwar Masculinity in Crisis: The History of Bachelor Pad Apartments in Midcentury America

Bachelor pad apartments were first introduced into the American consciousness by Playboy Magazine in the mid-1950s. The property type exemplified sleek, modern style aimed at single professional men and organized around entertaining and pleasure. Since their introduction, the bachelor pad has developed into a highly mythologized housing type and a cultural icon in American society. This presentation will examine the historic trends that contributed to the development of bachelor pad apartments including the rise in consumer culture during the post-WWII period, the erosion of traditional gender roles which led to a post-war “masculinity crisis,” and the development of an alternative concept of domestic masculinity for single men that arose during the 1950s and 1960s.

Sun, Heat, & Food Safety While Outdoors in AZ

This presentation will speak to sun, heat, and food safety while in being outdoors in Arizona. First, we will go over potential risks of overexposure to Ultra Violet radiation coming from the sun as well as going over strategies for protection and prevention of skin cancer. We will then move on to speak about how working outdoors makes you more vulnerable to heat illness. Find out how to prevent, recognize, and treat heat illness and how to stay safe in the Arizona sun. Lastly, we plan to highlight ways in which food safety practices can be applied during outdoor camping/hiking excursions to minimize potential risks from foodborne illness. Participants will better understand the food safety risks in an outdoor environment and steps that can be taken to provide safe food.

On the Border: Camp Naco

Camp Naco dates from a period of border unrest in the early twentieth century resulting from the Mexican Revolution, cross border violence, and even a German intrigue to enlist Mexico as an ally in World War I. To protect American interests, the camp was manned by the Ninth and Tenth Cavalry of Buffalo Soldiers between 1910 and 1923. Today it lies within sight of the newly-constructed border wall, referencing a time when segregated African American troops served as the bulwark of national defense in the Southwest. This session will illustrate how both the landscape and its context changed over time.

A Virtual Walk through the City's Past

Tour Phoenix's ethnic heritage story maps between Downtown's high-rises and warehouses, in neighborhoods, schools, and churches, to lands south of the Salt River – imprints of Phoenix's rich history are found in the buildings and places where diverse ethnic communities worked and lived. The City of Phoenix Ethnic Heritage Story Map series allows users to discover the lesser-known layers of the city's past. The online format with interactive media provides layers of engagement for experience and exploration at the user's own pace. These story maps are accessible and present the information in a familiar way, reaching diverse audiences beyond the city's limits and preservation professionals.

This session will provide a brief overview of Indian law and its applicability to Site Stewards and members of the general public. The discussion will address the various considerations that Stewards should be aware of as they conduct their rounds and interact with their peers.

By far, one of our most exciting workshops. Learn about all the different work the department has done to investigate stolen properties and return items to the country of origin. Since 2007 ICE has returned more than 11,000 items to 30 different countries. One of the notable items repatriated include a 500-year-old copy of a Christopher Columbus letter to the King of Spain describing his voyage and discoveries in the America's. The letter was stolen from the National Library of Catalonia in Barcelona and returned to Spain in 2018. Officials and agents from the Cultural Property, Art and Antiquities program will talk about examples of the different types of work they have done to recover and repatriate historic items, including work done here in Arizona.

These same persons were said to have boiled and polished the skull.” (*South Mountain Star*, May 8, 1969) There are a number of state and federal laws governing burials, graves, and cemeteries. Arizona law ensures forgotten burials are treated with respect. What are these laws and what is being done now to protect and remember Campo Santos Mexicanos?

Tour of Arrastre Creek on the Agua Fria National Monument

Site: Historic Hayden Mill, Tempe

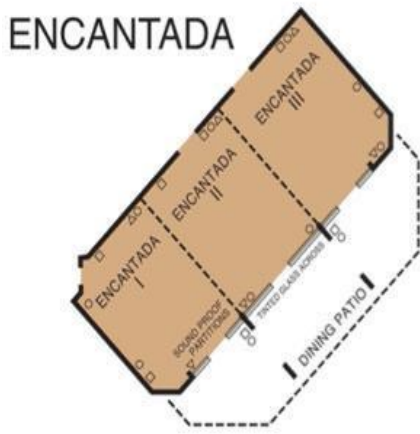
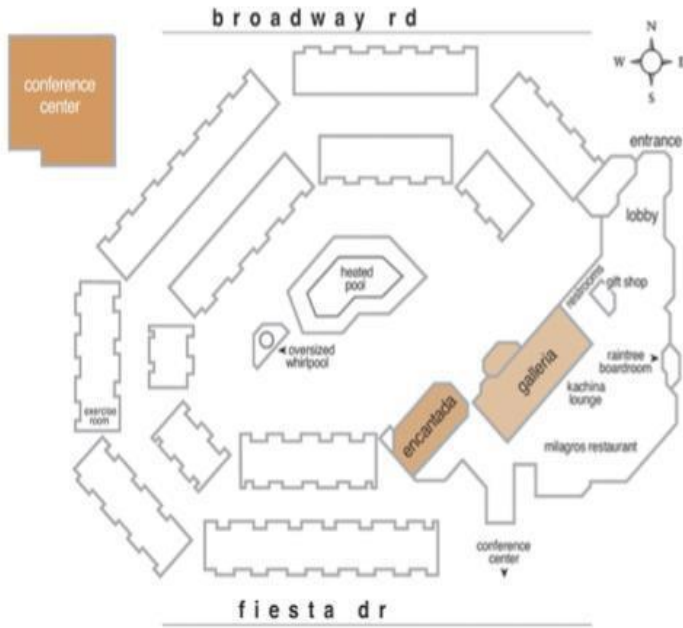

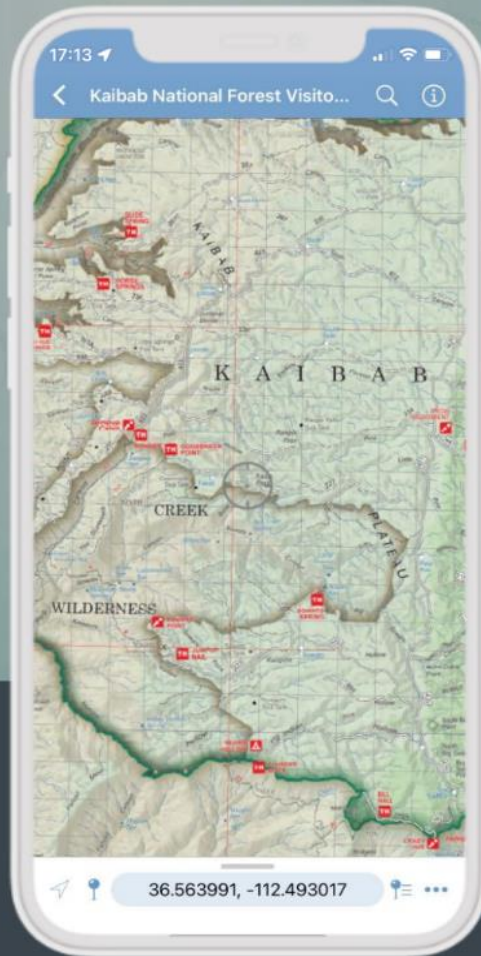
